

41 more lives lost in unrelenting rain in North, flood fury in states

NHs Washed Away; Infra Of ₹4k Cr Hit In HP

The combined might of the monsoon and a western disturbance continued to barrel down on north India, leaving 41 people dead in the past 24 hours and causing extensive landslides and flooding in the hills and the plains, with the swollen Beas, Sutlej and other rivers taking down houses and cars, submerging cities, villages and cropland.

On Monday, Himachal reported 10 deaths, 17 died in lightning strikes in UP, three more were killed in separate house collapses in western UP while Punjab, Haryana and

Rajasthan recorded four, five, and two fatalities, respectively.

In worst-hit Himachal, CM Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu put the death count at 17 (10 in the past 24 hours) and said the estimated loss to property was around Rs 4,000 crore. Relentless rain has caused widespread damage to infrastructure. Officials said 4,686 transformers were hit, leaving hundreds of villages in darkness.

A portion of the Manali-Leh national highway collapsed Monday, severing road connectivity to Lahaul-Spiti and Ladakh. Efforts were on to evacuate about 300 tourists and residents stranded in Lahaul-Spiti and Kullu districts using helicopters as soon as weather conditions permit.

Thousands being moved as Yamuna crosses danger mark, floods city areas

New Delhi: The Yamuna crossed the danger mark on Monday, flooding low-lying areas along the riverbanks in the city and prompting authorities to evacuate thousands of people living in the floodplains, reports **Abhinav Rajput**.

According to the central water commission, the level in the river shot up to 205.76 metres at 8pm, above the danger level of 205.33 metres, due to heavy rains in northern states and water release from Hathnikund Barrage in Haryana. Record rain overwhelmed drainage; 3 road cave-ins to be probed: CM

CM Kejriwal said on Monday that record rainfall had created problems for residents but efforts were on to mitigate them. After holding an emergency meeting with ministers and senior officials of various departments, Kejriwal said a probe had been ordered into three incidents of road cave-in. The unprecedented rainfall, he said, had overwhelmed the drainage system, resulting in complaints of waterlogging. **P2**

64% rain excess in North makes monsoon surplus

Northwest India is normally the driest of the country's four regions. But this rainy season so far, the region has received such disproportionately high rains that it has pulled the nationwide monsoon figures into surplus, reports **Amit Bhattacharya**.

While rainfall since June 1 has been deficient in 40% of the country, northwest India has a whopping 64% surplus.

In July, the region has so far logged more than double its normal quantity of rain, with a surplus of 104%. Overall, the monsoon is now 2% above normal in the country since the start of the season on June 1. **P8**
